Before Reading

High-Frequency Words

Practice reading these high-frequency words in the story:

sleep they very were

Meet the Characters

Get to know the characters from the story by looking at the pictures and names below:

Mortimer's Song

In the story, Mortimer sings the same song over and over again. Create a tune for this song and practice singing it before reading the story.

Rhyme Time

In Mortimer's song, two of the words rhyme: **clang** and **bang**. These words rhyme because they have the same ending (**-ang**). Create a list of new words that rhyme with bang (e.g., **fang** is a real word and **lang** is not, but both rhyme with **bang**).



Phonics

There is a **M** sound at the beginning of the word **Mortimer**.

Can you make a **M** sound?

Pay close attention to the shape of your mouth as you make the sound. It might be helpful to make this sound while you look in a mirror to see the shape your mouth makes.

Try these different activities to help practice the letter **M** sound.

- Take a close look around you and try to find three objects that start with the same sound.
- 2. Think of three other words that also start with the same sound. As an extra challenge, can you think of any words that end with a M sound?

- **3.** A simple word that has the **M** sound at the beginning is the word **mess**. As you read this word, pay attention to the two other letter sounds in the word.
- **4.** When two words rhyme, they have the same sounds at the end of the word. Take a look at the pictures below and point to any of the words that rhyme with **mess**.



5. While you read, look out for other **M** sounds at the beginning of a word throughout the story. You can see the sound easily because it will be written in a different color.
